Mit Brennender Sorge

Thoughts and updates from Fr. Albert

After a long hiatus, we return to our journey through important documents in the Church's history. You may recall that we last looked at what **Pope Pius XI** wrote in 1931 on the 40th anniversary of the important document **Rerum Novarum**, which dealt with various aspects of **Catholic Social Teaching**. Well, this week we take a look at a document that deals less with timeless principles and more directly with specific historical circumstances.

This document, **Mit Brennender Sorge** is a little unique in that it was not first written in Latin and translated as most papal documents are. It was written in German and it translates to mean "with deep anxiety." The reason for that is simple: it was written in 1937 and it was about the Nazis. At that point in history, the Reich had a lot of control and so the document was smuggled into the country and read from the every Catholic Church pulpit on Palm Sunday. It condemned the paganistic tendencies of the Reich.

Until this point, there was an uneasy peace between the Church and Germany because of what is called a **Concordat**. A concordat is like a treaty in which the Church tries to secure basic rights and protections in a given country. The terms vary from country to country, but it usually involves some basic freedom to preach, to select bishops, and to govern Church properties. It usually involves commitments to maintain communication between the two parties and a basic cooperation with civil law in some way whenever a matter involves both the Church and civil society. Earlier, in 1933,, the Church had signed a concordat with the German Reich that sough to gain basic religious freedoms in exchange for agreeing to keep priests and bishops out of political activities. The Nazis did not honor it and when the Church issued Mit Brennender Sorge, relations between the Church and Germany grew very strained.


This new document addressed violations of the concordat in addition to clarifying Church teachings that had a bearing on activities in the country. It condemned the idea of confining God and his blessings to a single race. This means that the idea of a "national religion" is false and contradicts the truth revealed by God. The pope warned against the idolatry of making race, nation, or people into the most important thing in a person's life. He also condemned the belief that God and the universe are one and the same (pantheism), which was a belief growing under Nazi influence.

Pope Pius XI also spend some time in the document clarifying what Catholics believe about human nature, morality, and the meaning of the supernatural. Nazis tried to collapse "immortality" into a racial concept, which conflicts with the truth that our souls live forever and will one day be reunited with an immortal body. They tried to redefine good and evil based on what was advantageous to themselves, but we know morality has an objective foundation established by God and unable to be changed. The Nazi emphasis on race and genetics obscured the fact that the true way to elevate human beings is through God's grace, so the pope exhorted German Catholics to renew their efforts to grow in this grace. Given the Nazi emphasis on pride and accomplishment, Pius XI also reminded them that excellence and humility are perfectly compatible in human beings; that it is possible for a person to be heroic without being proud or arrogant.

In conjunction with these basic teachings, the document addresses the need for people to learn and practice their faith. This led Pope Pius XI to write that "The believer has an absolute right to profess his Faith and live according to its dictates. Laws which impede this profession and practice of Faith are against natural law." He denounced any laws which tried to limit this freedom in Catholic schools. He then exhorted priests, religious, and parents to courageously continue to bear witness to the faith and to educate children in it despite obstacles placed by the Reich. He included praise of those who have already done this well as lament for those who have suffered at the hands of unjust laws.

As we mentioned this strained relations between the Church and Germany. The Reich seized printing presses, arrested hundreds of people, and began staging "immorality trials" against Church leaders designed to weaken their moral authority. Many Catholics responded with courage and many world leaders were pleased with the attempt, though some said it wasn't good enough. Whatever the case, we can hope to learn from it and work to prevent such evil from happening again.
