



#### Pastor's Column

#### Sacrosanctum Concilium I

Thoughts and updates from Fr. Albert

The Eucharistic Revival is ongoing and you'll continue to see periodic articles on that in this space. This week however, we can return to our usual practice of looking at Church documents. The last one we covered before the summer was Humanae Vitae by Pope Paul VI. Though highly controversial at the time, it has proven prophetic and is, in my opinion and the opinion of many others, the most significant thing Pope St. Paul VI wrote in his time as pope.

Now, however, it is time to turn to the most significant event in the Church in the last 100 years: the Second Vatican Council (1963-1965). As an ecumenical council, the documents it produced automatically come with some authority. Still, anything written by a council has to be endorsed by the pope for it to be legitimate. Although Pope St. John XXIII called for the council, all of the documents it produced were published during the reign of Pope Paul VI, which is why we're addressing them now.

The very first document published by the council is also the one that had the most visible impact on the whole church, at least from the perspective of most Catholics. It is the document on the liturgy, **Sacrosanctum Concilium** (**Dec 4**, **1963**, the title is Latin for "This Sacred Council"). Another document on the media was published on the same day, but this one is given precedence. And the council put this document first for a reason. For one thing, the Sacred Liturgy is the most central aspect of the faith because it is the thing "through which the work of our redemption is accomplished," as the document puts it. The liturgy unites us to the eternal worship of God in heaven, it makes present the one, eternal sacrifice of Christ that redeems us, and provides us with the Eucharist, which is the "source and summit" of our faith. For this reason, the council wanted to address first things first.

Another reason it is the first document is that pastors, theologians, and laity throughout the Church had been reflecting on the need for liturgical renewal for over 100 years. Pope Pius XII spoke of in his document, Mediator Dei, and some changes had already been made, but there was still general sense of a need for renewal. The major focus of that renewal movement was making the liturgy more fruitful in the life of more Catholics. This included things like educating the laity on what the liturgy is and does, teaching priests to more reverently celebrate the liturgy, and addressing a variety of bad habits and misconceptions that had crept into most people's experience of the Mass and the liturgy as a whole. So, the council fathers (bishops who attended the council) decided to sort through all of these desires and needs in order to lay out both the general principles of the liturgy as well as make some concrete decisions about it's celebration going forward.

Right away, the document clarifies that it applies primarily to the Roman Rite of the liturgy. You may remember that the Catholic Church includes 24 "Rites," drawing from different cultural and regional developments of the same faith. All are united under the pope and share the same faith, but each has some variations in how they celebrate Mass (or "Divine Liturgy" as some call it), their devotions, and some of their laws. The Roman or Latin Rite (us) is the biggest and the one most people know of. This document is clear that all the Rites enjoy equal rights and dignity and that it is primarily making changes to the Roman Rite, though some of the more fundamental principles will apply to all Rites. In other words, the Church still values diversity and does not want to take away *legitimate* cultural differences.

With that made clear, the document goes on to remind everyone of the basic truth that God has revealed himself in Jesus Christ, though whom he also redeemed us. He in turn gave the Church authority to carry on his mission. So the Church exists to proclaim Christ, to carry on his redeeming mission, and to glorify God. When the Church celebrates the liturgy (the 7 Sacraments and all the official rites and prayers), therefore, it "is considered as an exercise of the priestly office of Jesus Christ." This means that "no other action of the Church can equal its efficacy by the same title and to the same degree." In other words, the liturgy is the *most powerful thing the Church does*, because the Liturgy is always done by, with, and in Christ himself. This importance must be remembered in how the liturgy is celebrated. At the same time, the Church is clear that "the sacred liturgy does not exhaust the entire activity of the Church." So, no one should take this document to mean everything else is unimportant, nor should we mix up and muddle the liturgy by trying to make it into something it isn't. That being said, we are ready next week to look more deeply at what it is and how it should be done.
