

Thoughts and updates from Fr. Albert

Pacem in Terris: Human Rights

Note: This is not the homily. That can be found on our website.



Returning to our journey through papal teaching, our next document is called **Pacem in Terris**, which means "Peace on Earth" and was written by **Pope John XXIII in 1963**. As you can tell from the title, the document is about promoting peace throughout the world.

Pope John XXIII's opening point is direct: we can only have peace on earth if we follow God's law. He then immediately addresses the other thing that people expect to provide progress and peace: technology. What technology shows us is that "an astonishing order reigns" throughout the universe, an order that can be discovered and harnessed for the benefit of mankind. While many people say technology is a testimony to the greatness of humanity, the pope makes the claim that this actually shows the "infinite greatness of God, Who created the universe." It is, after all, his wisdom and power that made the universe so orderly and able to be understood. He also endowed us with the intelligence to discover and cooperate with that order. And yet, humanity is often in such great turmoil that this wonderful design seems hard to recognize. Pope John tells us that this is the result of human fickleness and because so many people make the mistake of thinking that the same laws which govern the physical universe also govern the relationship between men and governments. In other words, people reduce human society to material causes. This is foolish because it neglects the deeper order imprinted on the heart of man, one that is reflected in the fact that human beings have a conscience. This interior voice testifies to the existence of an order greater than mere physical laws.

So, Pope John XXIII sets out to speak of that order which should exist between human beings. There are foundational principles like "every human being is a person," meaning that have intelligence and free will as part of their nature. This gives human beings certain universal and inviolable rights and obligations. The pope tells us that "every man has the right to life, to bodily integrity, and to the means which are suitable for the proper development of life; these are primarily food, clothing, shelter, rest, medical care, and finally the necessary social services. Therefore a human being also has the right to security in cases of sickness, inability to work, widowhood, old age, unemployment, or in any other case in which he is deprived of the means of subsistence through no fault of his own." He goes on to include less foundational but still real right such as: respect, a good reputation, freedom for searching for the truth, freedom of expressing opinions (within the limits of morality and the common good), and being informed truthfully about public events.

Pope John also defends a right to an education in keeping with the developmental level of the society in which that person lives. He goes on to say that people should have the opportunity to go on to higher studies in accord with their ability. He is careful to remind us society as a whole has a responsibility to help provide for this education but that parents have a *prior right* in directing and providing for the education of their own children. In general, it's important to remember that whenever the Church speaks of rights, they are always joined to responsibilities. For example, the right to education comes with the responsibility to put one's abilities into the service of society. To ignore the attached responsibilities would undercut a person's claim to those rights.

There is also the right to freedom of conscience: a person ought to be free to practice their religions privately *and publicly*. This includes the freedom to choose one's own state in life, whether that's marriage or a vocation to the religious life or priesthood. Again, this right is tied to the responsibility to seek the truth; one cannot hide behind conscience claims to justify a selfish or destructive way of life.

In terms of economics, human beings have the right to pursue a living. This right means they ought to be paid fairly and sufficiently and be able to maintain private property. Again, this right is not unlimited, but is rooted in the responsibility of providing for oneself and others. The right to private property is an effective way to enable people to meet that responsibility, but it is *always* rooted in social duty and cannot be used to justify greed.

All of these rights ought to be observed and promoted through a "great variety of organizations and intermediate groups" that can accomplish what individuals cannot. This is connected to the right of association and the right to freely move within the country and even to emigrate. It supports the right of each person to take an active part in public affairs. This in turn gives rise to the responsibility of protecting these rights in others through both individual respect and through juridical measures. As Pope St. John puts it, "a well-ordered human society requires that men recognize and observe their mutual rights and duties. It also demands that each contribute generously to the establishment of a civic order in which rights and duties are more sincerely and effectively acknowledged and fulfilled." Establishing this civic order is the point of the document and we'll pick up next time looking at how to do that while considering the "three distinctive characteristics" of the time in which the pope was writing.
