Pastor's Column

Pope Benedict XVI

Thoughts and updates from Fr. Albert

Though we're still on Pope John XXIII in our journey through papal teaching, I'm going to jump ahead a few popes to Benedict XVI in honor of his death last week. Please continue to pray for him and to ask his intercession.

Born on April 16, 1927 (Holy Saturday that year) in Marktl, Bavaria, Joseph Ratzinger was the third child of Joseph Ratzinger Sr. Interestingly, Joseph Sr. met his wife, Maria Peintner, by placing a very straightforward singles ad in the newspaper when he was 43. She, 36 years old, responded and they were married four months later. Described by the future pope as "strict but fair," Joseph Sr. was a police officer and Maria the daughter of a baker who had training as a cook.

At the age of five, Joseph Ratzinger Jr. once saw a cardinal dressed up in his distinctive red clerical attire and reportedly told everyone that he wanted to be a cardinal one day. As he grew older, the Nazis rose to power and his family's opposition to them caused them a great deal of trouble. At the age of 14, he was conscripted into the Hitler Youth - a fact journalists sometimes tried to use against him - but he was an uncooperative member of the organization. That reluctance continued throughout his military career and he apparently did not face direct combat. He deserted towards the end of the war and spent some time as a prisoner of war under the American soldiers.

After the war, Joseph and his older brother Georg both entered seminary to become priests. Though Georg was a year ahead of Joseph, he prolonged his time in preparation for a year and the two brothers were ordained at the same time: June 29 1951 in Freising. Joseph became a professor at the University of Bonn in 1959 and then at Munster in 1963. At that point, the **Second Vatican Council** had just begun and Fr. Joseph Ratzinger was a theological consultant at those meetings. Back then, Fr. Ratzinger was seen as a reformer and an ally of those calling for radical changes in the Church. As time went on, however, history has shown him to be balanced and faithful to the Church even when his colleagues and supposed theological "allies" kept pushing the envelope - at least one of them wound up excommunicated. Some people claimed that he suddenly turned away from "liberal" ideas to more "conservative" ones, but he insisted that his theological work was consistent throughout and that it was shifts in the world around him that made it look like he had changed directions. Though Fr. Ratzinger explored many theological concepts, he remained a dedicated son of the Church and her Tradition. He frequently defended the teachings of the council, but was always an advocate of the continuity of the Church before and after the Council. His academic work continued for the rest of his life, even into his time as Pope.

In 1977, Fr. Ratzinger was appointed the Archbishop of Munich and Freising in Germany. His motto was *Cooperatores Veritatis*, Latin for "cooperators of the truth." He was name a cardinal not long after. Pope St. John Paul II named him the Prefect of the **Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith (CDF)**, which basically made him the second most powerful teacher and theologian in the Church. The CDF (now renamed to DDF) is the office in the Church responsible for ensuring doctrinal correctness within the Church. This put him in the position of having to correct and sometimes call for the punishment and even excommunication of people who formerly considered him allies. Faithful to the Church, Cardinal Ratzinger often pointed out heresy among theologians and worked brilliantly to bolster a correct understanding of the faith at every level. The CDF was also responsible for handling the cases of priests who committed certain crimes, including sexual abuse. People have tried to lay the blame for all sorts of crimes at his feet, but their claims are often flimsy. He worked hard to do the right thing in every case that came to his attention. There is of course controversy and debate around what the "right thing" was, but there's no credible claim that Ratzinger did anything malicious or enabled further abuses.

Cardinal Ratzinger tried a few times to resign his prominent position and do quieter, simpler work behind the scenes, but wasn't allowed to. In 2005, after four ballots, he was elected the pope to succeed John Paul II and took the name Benedict XVI. His work and teaching as pope are something we'll come back to in due time, but we can say all of it was in continuity with his work before. He worked hard to emphasize the continuity of the Church, the priority of a living faith in theology, and the primacy of Love in everything. As internal struggles and age caught up to him, Pope Benedict XIV discerned that the Lord was asking him to step aside. So, in 2013, Benedict XVI became the first pope to resign in 600 years. He continued to serve as "Pope Emeritus," meaning his was not in charge anymore, but still closely connected to the Church's leadership. He spent the remainder of his days praying for the Church. He passed last Saturday, Dec 31, 2022. His last words were "Lord, I love you." May he receive his reward and may his prayers remain with us!
