Pacem in Terris V

Thoughts and updates from Fr. Albert

Last we looked at Pope St. John XXIII's encyclical *Pacem in Terris*, we saw how he encouraged better relationships between different countries. We pick up this week with his general exhortation to us to take "an active part in public life." It is the way in which we contributed to the common good not only of our own family, but also our country and the rest of the world. He is careful to specify as well that we *should* look to the light of faith in how we strive to shape various institutions and social structures. While the secular world continues to think that society should just let people do what they want and seek after wealth and pleasure, the pope continues to teach that the goal is "man's perfectioning of himself both in the natural order as well as in the supernatural." In other words, a good society is one that helps human beings become *better human beings*, not just richer ones. The goal is virtue and a society of mutual love and service, not just bland freedom.

A key part of changing society is to live our own lives in a faithful way. But, because we are by nature part of a society, we still have to consciously try to influence "various organizations" where possible. Not every person can affect every institution, but where we can, we should. This means advocating for and supporting laws, bylaws, and organization practices that uphold basic natural law. It means pushing back against tendencies towards greed, selfishness, and exploitation in whatever groups we belong to. It also means holding specifically Catholic institutions to Catholic standards. The pope here laments that many such organizations: charities, schools, and fraternities that are Catholic in name are no longer Catholic in practice - too many have allowed material and technological success to be all they focus on. For Pope John, a major part of solving this is to improve Christian education. He notes that many people gain advanced education in various disciplines (math, science, etc.) but leave their faith at a "elementary level." Catholics should be trained not only in what we believe, but in how to live that in the world around them. Equipped with this knowledge and virtue, such Catholics should also be confident in defending the ideas in this document because those ideas are based on Natural Law and not just on revelation and faith. We can and should defend them using rational arguments and good example.

In engaging with others outside the faith, the pope reminds us of the difference between error and the *person* who believes that error. While we oppose the first, we must love and respect the second. Working with them, seeking common ground, and treating them with kindness are often key to helping them see the truth. Similarly, the pope makes a distinction between bad philosophical ideas and broader social movements. The truth does not change, but often social movements can and do. This means that prudent cooperation, careful defense of the truth, and patience can often lead to a situation where we begin to work with and even endorse social movements that at one time we opposed. Politics and social cooperation are complicated and we must resist the temptation to reduce people and movements to their ideas, as if being wrong made them unworthy of our attention. Gradual progress towards the truth is not only possible, it is what we should generally expect. He connects this point to a quote from Pope Pius XII who said "salvation and justice are not to be found in revolution, but in evolution through concord."

Finally, Pope St. John XXIII concludes the whole document with a general reminder of the importance of being obedient to the order established by God. He points to St. Augustin who taught that it is by submitting to God's design that we gain greater control and freedom over ourselves and our lower inclinations. The whole of this document has been an exploration of what God's design for social order is, so that we might better follow it. We all know there is much work to do and that even as we make progress in one area we often lose progress in another. For this reason, our efforts must always be supported by prayer. Pope John closes out with prayer to the Lord who said "peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give it to you." Let us then continue to look to the Lord for that peace that only he can give. Let us ask him to give us the grace to receive that peace and bring into the world around. Let us also ask for and trust in the intercession of the many saints who have gone before us.

Lord, have mercy! Hear our prayer! Pope St. John XXIII, pray for us! All you holy men and women, pray for us!
