

Thoughts and updates from Fr. Albert

Last week, we looked at some of Pope St. John XXIII's teachings regarding relationships between different countries and between different ethnic groups within a single country. This week, we turn to his assessment of the stockpiling of weapons. As you might have guessed, the pope notes "with deep sorrow... the enormous stocks of armaments that have been and still are being made in more economically developed countries." He is aware of the reasoning behind it, the claim that developed countries need to be able to keep up with other developed countries but is also keen to point out that this stockpiling is leading to increasing fear of mutual destruction via nuclear weapons. Remember that he wrote this in 1963, right in the middle of the Cold War when constant fear of nuclear war was commonplace. Not only is the fear an issue, but Pope John also points out that merely continuing to test nuclear weapons can have lasting negative effects on the world and the environment.

It is no surprise then, that St. John XXIII - like many world leaders - called for an end to the arms race, a reduction of stockpiles, and the banning of nuclear weapons. Since that time, the world has seen occasional agreements and arms reduction deals, but nuclear weapons have not only remained in existence, but become more powerful than ever. The pope recognizes clearly that it is impossible to completely stop the creation and stockpiling of weapons through external forces like laws and political pressure. The only hope of real progress is through "inner conviction." What needs to change is not the balance of power, but the very guiding principles of those in power. Peace, as he has often pointed out, is not merely the absence of conflict, but the presence of justice. The way to ending arms races is not through mutually assured destruction, but through the building of mutual trust. Extreme as that may seem, the pope shrewdly points out that relationship between individuals function best when based on justice and cooperation rather than fear. If that is true for individuals, it is also true for communities. So, that's what he calls for. Invoking his authority in a very formal way, Pope St. John XXIII here issues a call to "the highest and most authoritative assemblies" to "spare no pain or effort" in developing peaceful relationships between nations through negotiations and mutual trust.

There's a few things that should be obvious to us when we look back on this. One is to see that there was a certain kind of growing optimism about the world during the 1960s that has proven to be misplaced. Second is that the Pope's call and challenge is built on a very important premise: authentic Christian witness. His calls for peace and trust and good will are built on the Natural Law and on the idea that Christians have been and will continue to evangelize the world around them. He's not naïve enough to think that simply asking people to be nice will solve problems. He envisions this call as part of the wider framework of the Church's effort to convert hearts and minds to truth and love. Only a world sufficiently inundated with converted people would be able to produce such a political arrangement. Sadly, we know that faith as a whole has precipitously declined since that time. Christians make up a smaller portion of the population and authentic practice among those called Christian is much less common.

From the problem of war and weapons, Pope John turns to question of global relations. Noting how technology has made the world a smaller place, he calls for a greater sense of neighborliness on a worldwide scale. Because society is increasingly global it produces global difficulties. This is why the pope then advocates for a kind of global public authority to address global problems. Some people reading that will react strongly with fears about the "New World Order" and imagine a totalitarian take over. Certainly, that kind of thing - any kind of evil regime - is possible when wicked men rise to power. But we should be clear that the pope explicitly teaches that any kind of global authority must be set up by common accord and not imposed by force. He goes on to write that nations, particularly smaller and less influential ones, are "right in not easily yielding obedience to an authority imposed by force, or to an authority in whose creation they had no part, or to which they themselves did not decide to submit by their own free choice." He's not calling for a single world government, but an international association of governments that can collaborate in solving issues to big for any one country. He points to the United Nations and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights of 1948 as a good, but not perfect start. The solution to its imperfections is not to avoid all international cooperation, but for Christians to better influence those institutions from within through witness, evangelization, and charity.
