Pastor's Column

Humanae Vitae III

Thoughts and updates from Fr. Albert

We saw last week that Pope St. Paul VI upheld the traditional teaching the practice of artificial contraception is wrong. He explained in this document that sin comes from an *act of the will* against life when engaging in the conjugal act. I urge you to think carefully about what is really being said. Americans in particular are very pragmatic and consequence driven. We tend to think that what matters most is the outcome. People will say things like "if it gets done, why does it matter how it got there?" and "all that matters are the results." That's simply not true. All people die eventually, but there is a big difference between someone dying from a disease like cancer vs being injected with a lethal medication. Yes, in both cases the person dies, but only one situation involves a *choice to commit murder*. This cuts both ways. We don't get credit for something good happening on it's own. If someone asks me to work for an hour at a soup kitchen and I refuse, they will probably still manage to feed all the people who visit the kitchen. The outcome is the same people get fed - but in one situation I receive grace for helping whereas in the other I get nothing.

So yes, the outcome does matter, but it is not the *only* thing that matters. My *choices* matter, *even if they do not change the outcome*. This is important in understanding the difference between artificial contraception and Natural Family Planning or the difference between someone using artificial contraception and someone who is naturally infertile. When a married couple decides to have sex while one of them is infertile, they probably won't get pregnant. When a married couple uses artificial contraception, they probably won't get pregnant. In both cases, the outcome is the same but only one of them involves *a deliberate rejection of God's design*. For a Catholic, responsible parenthood requires us to *cooperate with God's design* because fertility, sexuality, marriage, and human nature are all gifts from God. Generally speaking, sex is naturally ordered towards two things: union and procreation. All other things being equal, the choice to have sex is *by default* a choice to be united to the other and to be open to the possibility of life. Even though sex only results in a new life a fraction of the time, that fundamental openness is still there. This is why St. Paul VI deliberately phrases his teaching as "each and every marriage act must *remain open* to the transmission of life." The natural design is openness and we must *remain* in that state of openness. It is only when we use our reason and free will in the wrong way that we can contradict or reject that fundamental openness. Thanks to Original Sin and Concupiscence, this is something we do quite easily and quite often.

To put it another way, when a married couple comes together sexually, they are expressing a total gift of themselves to the other. If they happen to be infertile at that moment, it is still a total self-gift of themselves as they are in that moment. But, if one of them makes a *second choice* to simultaneously hold back a part of themselves (by using the pill or another device to counteract their own fertility), they are *not* making a total self-gift. They would then be partly *lying* to their spouse and to themselves by saying one thing with their bodies ("I am totally yours") while saying another thing with their choice to contradict their own human nature ("I won't give you my fertility").

As you have probably realized by now, it is still possible for a person to use Natural Family Planning in the wrong way. A person's attitude and intention do matter. It is possible to use the right *method* for the wrong *reasons*. We call this the "contraceptive mentality" and it is also a sin. This is something the Church (especially Pope St. John Paul II) addresses in a variety of ways after this encyclical. Still, the primary goal of this document is to make the point that some *methods* are always wrong, regardless of intentions and circumstances. Artificial contraception, by it's very nature, involves a *choice* against Human Nature and God's design. So, it is always sinful to use it for the purpose of avoiding pregnancy.

It's worth noting that the pope also immediately addresses crimes against the *unitive* side of sex as well. He isn't just obsessed with babies. He states clearly that "a conjugal act imposed without regard for his or her condition and lawful desires is not a true act of love." Put plainly, everyone understands that forcing yourself on another - even your spouse - is a sin against the unitive meaning of sex because it contradicts that fundamental expression of love that it is supposed to be. So, it shouldn't be hard for us to see that *forcibly* separating fertility from sex is also violation of what sex is supposed to be. From here, the pope then turns to make a few predictions about the consequences of a widespread acceptance of this violation. As I've mentioned before, we'll see that these predictions turn out to be prophetic in their accuracy.
