

Humanae Vitae IV

Thoughts and updates from Fr. Albert

Note: This is not the homily. That can be found on our website.

Over the past three weeks, we've examined the Church's reaffirmation of her teaching on artificial contraception. Having issued his declaration and offered some explanation, Pope St. Paul VI then proffers some predictions about what will happen in the world if artificial contraception is accepted and practiced on a large scale.

He **begins** by pointing out "how wide and easy a road would thus be opened up towards conjugal infidelity and the general lowering of morality." The reason for this is pretty intuitive. As Paul VI puts it, "men, especially the young... have need of encouragement to be faithful to the moral law, so that they must not be offered some easy means of eluding its observance." In other words, because human beings are weak they are more likely to sin if you take away the consequences. Worse, this tendency is still there even if people merely *think* they can escape consequences whether or not that turns out to be true. The use of contraception offers the illusion of consequence-free sex, but in fact only sometimes prevents *one* consequence. Because it is the most visible, people are easily misled into thinking everything is fine when that one is avoided.

Has this come true? Yes. The rate of divorce and infidelity rose pretty steadily over the next 50 years. Anyone taking a look around today should be able to tell that sexual immorality is much more rampant and flagrant than it was prior to the 60s. The number of children born outside of wedlock has more than doubled in that time. Is contraception the only factor? Of course not, but it's obvious that the cultural effect of telling multiple generations of teenagers that they can escape consequences has only increased careless behavior.

The **second prediction**: The pope writes that "it is also to be feared that the man, growing used to the employment of anti-conceptive practices, may finally lose respect for the woman and, no longer caring for her physical and psychological equilibrium, may come to the point of considering her as a mere instrument of selfish enjoyment, and no longer as his respected and beloved companion." Again, getting people in the habit of simply taking a pill to avoid consequences allows them to bypass the work of *understanding* the person they are interacting with. Fed the lie of sex as a safe and free exchange of "services," men in general have failed to appreciate the complexity in the way they would have had they been forced to reckon with all that sex entails.

Has this come true? I think that should be obvious as well. Look at the rates of mental illness and suicide in young women. Look at the constant bombardment of unrealistic women in media. Look at the *massive* increase in the production of pornography. Certainly the internet has been just as significant a factor, but even a lot of that content was only made possible by the lie of consequence-free sex.

The **third prediction is the abuse of power**. St. Paul VI shrewdly points out that "a dangerous weapon would thus be placed in the hands of those public authorities who take no heed of moral exigencies." Armed with the technology to "control" birth rates, governments and large organizations will almost certainly think themselves justified in using this power to preserve the "greater good." By this time in history, forced sterilization had already been tried by Nazi Germany and even in the U.S. The widespread acceptance of selective self-sterilization as morally legitimate would only further embolden governments to try something similar.

Has this come true? Think of China's one child policy, which mandated widespread use of contraception and then resorted to abortion when that failed. They've since abandoned it, but have found that it's probably too late to avoid social collapse. A lot of "charity" organizations that operate in Africa make contraception a primary focus of their work. (Note: do <u>not</u> give to the Melinda Gates Foundation). Every year or so I see another article from a public activist in Africa decrying the fact that the western world keeps trying to impose their hatred of children by constantly peddling contraceptives as a "solution." We also see doctors and hospitals in our country threatened with loss of license if they refuse to cooperate in these immoral practices.

Sadly, that's not all. Next time, we'll look at the pope's fourth prophecy and his concluding exhortations.
