

Pastor's Column

Humanae Vitae V

Thoughts and updates from Fr. Albert

In our fifth and final week looking at Humanae Vitae by Pope St. Paul VI, we pick up with the **fourth** and final prediction of what widespread acceptance of artificial contraception would cause. The first three were: lowering of morality and increase of infidelity, loss of respect for women, and governments forcing these technologies to "control" populations and interfere in the sacred bond of the family.

Unlike the others, this last warning is less explicit, but is a theme that runs throughout the document: **man's domination of his own body**. The pope notes in a few places that human beings do in fact have some dominion over themselves. He exhorts people to practice that dominion in the form of rational self-control. But he also reiterates that "one must necessarily recognize **insurmountable limits to the possibility of man's domination** over his own body and its functions." By widespread acceptance of artificial contraception, mankind furthers the illusion of absolute control, leading to ever greater distortions of his own nature. These limits are not arbitrary rules that can be ignored by technology, but come from the nature of what it means to be human. Pope Pius XII called it the "principle of totality."

For example, no one controls their own birth and no one has direct control over things like digestion and dozens of other necessary functions in the body. Part of being human is accepting what we are and *cooperating* with that nature rather than trying to override it. This same principle is part of why it is sinful to get drunk, to mutilate ourselves, or to take our own life. In the same way, the ability to procreate is *entrusted* to us, but is not *completely ours to control*. Sadly, whenever we accept the idea of *complete dominion* in one aspect of life, we inevitably start to apply that idea in other aspects. As Pope Paul VI says here, by accepting the false dominion offered by artificial contraception, mankind inevitably seeks out other, even more harmful forms of self-domination.

Has this come true? Absolutely. Simply look at the increase of assisted suicide, artificial procreation ("test tube babies") and the rise of gender ideology. People increasingly believe they have the right to so dominate their bodies as to completely reject them by killing them or trying to turn them into something they are not (e.g. a man trying to become a woman). People want to blame gender ideology on a lot of different causes, but the majority of the blame should fall on the widespread acceptance of artificial contraception. Once we accepted the idea that sex and life were no longer connected, it wasn't a far leap to accept the idea that it doesn't matter who you have sex with (same-sex activity) and from there to the idea that you can do whatever you want with your own body's sexual identity, even to the point of trying to change.

Having explained the principles, clarified the teaching, and warned us about the consequences, Pope Paul VI then turns to his closing exhortations. He knows that "this teaching will perhaps not be easily received by all." He responds by reminding us that we are meant to be a "sign of contradiction" just as Jesus was. He doubles down on this difficult teaching and explains that, even if people hate us for it, our stubbornness on this issue actually contributes to a more "truly human civilization" because we are defending what it actually means to be human. He admits that this teaching will be very difficult to put into practice, but reminds us that it is meant to be an effort shared by individuals, families, communities, and the whole Church. Above all, he points to our perpetual need for God's grace to strengthen us.

In closing, Pope St. Paul VI addresses a variety of groups to encourage them in the part they will play in proclaiming and defending the truth about human life. Teachers are praised for their role in explaining the truth. Rulers are challenged to consider their responsibility to families, which are the most fundamental block of society. Scientists are exhorted to cooperate with nature by better developing Natural Family Planning rather than contradicting it with the brute force of chemicals and machines. Married couples are reminded that the education, discipline, and communication needed to practice this teaching will make them better people and strengthen their relationships. Instead of selfishly seeking sexual pleasure whenever they want, this forces them to selfless consideration for the other as a whole person. Priests and bishops are challenged to uphold this doctrine and proclaim it in all charity - something we know fare too few actually did. And yet, as time passes, more and more Catholics and even non-Catholics are realizing, the Church was right. She still is. Thanks be to God that, every year, more priests, bishops, and married couples are realizing this and living it out.


