

Thoughts and updates from Fr. Albert

Sacrosanctum Concilium VII: The Liturgy of the Hours

We return this week to our ongoing journey through Vatican II's document on the liturgy, Sacrosanctum Concilium (1963). The document beautifully reminds us that Jesus "continues His priestly work through the agency of His Church, which is ceaselessly engaged in praising the Lord and interceding for the salvation of the whole world." This image and reality of constant prayer by the Church is seen perhaps most clearly in the **Divine Office**, which we now call the **Liturgy of the Hours**. It is the set of prayers that every priest, deacon, and religious man or woman prays every day. They are structured to take place at certain times of day to sanctify the day and so are called "hours" even though they don't usually take a full hour. When taken in connection with the whole world, it means that there is basically always some part of the Church that is actively praying these prayers at any given moment.

Over time, it became very common for priests and even some religious to cram all of the "hours" into a single, extended time slot, preferring to get them all done rather than risking a busy schedule preventing them from getting some done at the proper times. That isn't completely wrong. Still, the Church wanted to renew the intention to spread throughout the day. Hence, She asked that the **Breviary** (the book which has the prayers in it) be revised to facilitate that. The major changes were the removal of one "hour," shortening most of the others, adding a wider variety of readings, and adjusting the requirements especially of priests and religious in certain forms of active ministry. It wasn't specified in the document, but a byproduct of the emphasis on the proper hours caused people to start calling it "The Liturgy of the Hours" instead of the Divine Office. They are the same thing, technically, but some people still use the older term and sometimes they use it to refer to the old version. Also, individual monasteries often have permission to use their own variations.

As we've seen repeatedly throughout this document, it does give permission to use the vernacular (local language) if authorized by a legitimate authority. Again as we've seen repeatedly, some people got carried away. I know of one monastery in the United States where someone in Rome at the council called the monastery the day this was published and told the monks to translate the prayers for the next day overnight. So, a whole monastery full of monks prayed in Latin, went to bed, and with no warning at all, woke up the next day to pray their morning prayers in English. There was no approval by proper authority, the translation was rushed, and it was forced on people without asking their opinion. Even if you think moving away from Latin is a good idea, that was not the way to go about it. Some of these monks had prayed in Latin for over 70 years. Most of them were fluent in Latin. It's an arrogant thing unilaterally change it such a jarring way. Unfortunately, people with agendas manipulated the situation to impose their ideas on millions of people without warning and contrary to the actual intentions of the Second Vatican Council.

Now, many people *did* do it the right way. Priests who wanted to switch had to ask permission and most of the priests in the world *did ask*. So, almost every diocese in the world very quickly developed translations and got them approved. Soon most priests in the world began praying in their own native language, though even today every priest has the option to pray in Latin and some do. I personally prefer to pray the Liturgy of the Hours in English most of the time, but must admit that some of the translations aren't very good. Fortunately, a new translation that is less rushed is almost finished and will be rolled out in the next few years.

The last thing to mention about the Breviary/Divine Office/Liturgy of the Hours is that the Church asked pastors to offer it in their parishes for their parishioners to join in. It mentions especially Vespers (evening prayer) on Sundays and special feasts. I do try to offer that on special days like our Patronal feast of St. John and we used to have vespers on Thursdays. You can find a few parishes that still offer that chance. The CJCs in St. Martinville are a religious order, so they also pray these hours and sometimes allow people a chance to join them. They even sing most of it, which the document says is preferred. Either way, the document encourages the laity to pray these hours privately or in their own groups, something that is much easier now that they are shorter, in English, and easily found on a variety of websites and apps. You can find one such resource on our parish website (under Sacraments, Mass Readings and Daily Prayer) and I encourage everyone to give the Liturgy of the Hours a chance, even if it ends up not being a regular thing.


